That means that you need to be willing to give up your own time to join in.

Public-speaking is a really useful skill to have so that you can take part in assemblies and other events, but you don't have to do anything that you're not comfortable with. What's important to Miss Dixon and the group is to create an open, welcoming, tolerant environment where everyone feels included and safe. They love a lively debate because the members are very passionate about what they do.

We asked Miss Dixon what she enjoys most about Student Council. She said: "It is definitely one of the highlights of my week when I get to see them. They are such a lovely, committed group of students who want to have an impact."

The Student Council has done a lot, but we asked Miss Dixon what the biggest success has been so far.

"We really enjoy seeing the points we raise being acted on by the Academy," she said. One example of this is the positive changes to the dining room and catering this year, which have come partly from the discussions of the School Council. But they don't just make life better in school - they also care about others.

"I think I am most proud of the School Council when they rally round. For example, collecting the equipment to pack and deliver 364 shoeboxes and 3 van loads of aid for Ukraine within 10 days was an incredible achievement," Miss Dixon explained. Student Librarians

The library is a fun and vibrant place to be. There is always something happening there. In addition to our regular activities: reading, board games and socialising, we also run various after-school clubs. Recently, the student librarians helped Mrs Wilkinson to rearrange the library so the books are now grouped by genre – something that has gone down equally well with avid readers and reluctant readers alike, as it is so much easier to find a book you will enjoy. We are always wanting to expand our collection of books, so there is a list on the library noticeboard where students can add book requests. Pastoral Fun

Recently, changing to pastoral year groups, we have been able to tailor our pastoral programme to age related topics and subjects, ranging from careers advice and revision techniques for the older students to road safety and the misuse of social media for the younger students. Each week a new topic is planned, and the year group assembly is based around that topic, the reflection section which we call our quiet time every day, is focused around that topic too, giving the students a time to reflect on how they are personally affected by what they are learning about.

Some of the topics we have covered are: Random Acts of Kindness, Acceptance and Inclusion, Healthy Minds, what makes a good friend, E-safety, Dangers of Drugs, Vaping and Smoking. We have had visiting speakers and performances like Jax's Story, and we have celebrated our traditional holidays like Christmas, Easter, Diwali, and Valentine's Day. National Remembrances are also important; Holocaust Day, Black History month and International Women's Day are but a few.

Celebrating success happens every term in the form of a 'fun' assembly; Heads or tails is played, a group quiz or challenge or even a newspaper treasure hunt running around the Sports hall; the Governor's Celebration is more formal, and parents of nominated students help join in the celebrations. Our students are given a diverse pastoral programme which enriches their time at the academy. Do you ever scribble on a desk? Do you ever litter at school? Do you ever put gum under the desk?

We spoke to Mr Harris; his job is Campus Development Manager at Nunthorpe Academy. In his role, he walks the academy site each morning to make sure that there are no health and safety concerns, he manages the site and cleaning teams, he completes risk assessments for the academy, and he arranges all maintenance and service-level agreements. When asked about his job, he said: "Every day is different. Therefore, you come to work not knowing what is ahead. If you manage your staff correctly, they will make it easier and a more enjoyable environment to work in."

The Site Team are the invisible heroes who make sure that the school is well maintained, including checking that that doors are locked, emergency routes are clear, litter-picking is carried out, assembly chairs are there waiting for us, bins are empty and all other general repairs and maintenance are completed.

But we all have a part to play in keeping Nunthorpe Nice. This could be as simple as placing litter in the bin, using recycling bins and taking care in our classrooms and corridors. In the future, Mr Harris would like to see students take more responsibility, perhaps with recycling or litter-picking initiatives and student monitors.

She uses a lot of different methods of communication in order to inform students about voluntary and compulsory events: Class Charts announcements, TV screens and posters around school and the weekly Nunthorpe News, to name just a few. In the library itself, you will find a remarkable range of genres, including non-fiction and up-to-date magazines. There are games, clubs, and activities too! This is all set in a relaxing, welcoming and positive environment. Mrs Wilkinson started her career as a child-minder and after that worked as an English teacher. Fun fact: Mrs Wilkinson is also the author of many children books, written under a pseudonym. She tells me that her favourite part of being a librarian is when reluctant readers tell her that they enjoyed a book and ask for another one that is similar. Mrs Wilkinson says: "I enjoy working with children and have a passion for reading and writing so working in a school library always seemed like the perfect fit for me". But it's not just Mrs Wilkinson who is on hand to help in the library - there are also student librarians. Students who want to become student librarians will need to fill out an application form before being interviewed by Miss Cesarano and Mrs Wilkinson. "During social time, before and after school, the library becomes full of students which is one of its greatest successes," she added. Mr Glasbey, Trust Vice Principal

My name is Dan Glasbey and I am the new Trust Vice Principal at Nunthorpe Academy. My initial remit is School Improvement, but I also have a role to play in future Nunthorpe Multi-Academy Trust expansion. I started on 25th April and at the time of writing have been in post for seven weeks. My role has initially focused on a pastoral review - focusing on behaviour, attendance, the pastoral curriculum and the systems and structures around that. I have also been looking closely at the sixth form, with a focus on boosting uptake into Year 12.

Prior to joining Nunthorpe Academy, I worked at UTC South Durham in Newton Aycliffe where I was Vice Principal for four years, focusing on timetable, curriculum, assessment, and standards. Before the UTC I worked at three other secondary schools, including two in North London, in a variety of roles.
