


Historical Horizons

Year 11 History students have been studying the Civil Rights Movement (CRM) in the USA. There was a particular focus on the awful segregation and discrimination that black people faced in the Deep South of America during this period. Many of our students were shocked to learn that during this period it was perfectly legal to act in such an unjust way towards another person because of their race.

Students have also examined the growth of the CRM from its beginnings with the Brown vs Topeka Case (1954), which challenged segregation in schools, to the Montgomery Bus Boycott (1955-56) and beyond. Students have studied key figures in the movement, such as Martin Luther King, Rosa Parks and Malcolm X. They have compared the methods of protest used by Martin Luther King (non-violence) and Malcolm X (Black Pride), and considered which were the most effective forms of protest. Students were also able to make links between this topic and more recent events, such as the murder of George Floyd (2020) and the rise of the Black Lives Matter protests.







Geographically speaking...

Our amazing Geography department have been busy this year! KS3 students have had plenty of thought-provoking discussions regarding Ukraine, access to water and inequality. Year 10 have been learning about climate change and climate refugees, the social injustice of climate change and how the wealthier countries who have profited the most will also be the least affected. Students were encouraged to reflect on their own personal responses to events, problems and changes. This has led to some very interesting debates inside and outside of the classroom.

Year 11 have been learning about the development gap and how the poorest 50% of the global population share just 8% of total income. At the same time, the richest 10% of the global population earn over 50% of total income. The students have also been reflecting on the wealth differences between the average UK citizen and the average citizen of the world. They say that this has given them a whole new perspective regarding how fortunate many of them are.

Nunthorpe's Got **Talent!**

Our Music department organised an amazing event that showcased a diverse array of talents ranging from magicians to singers and dancers. With our wonderful students displaying their skills and creativity, the event captivated the audience with mesmerizing performances by our fantastic Nunthorpe students.

The judges, including our very own Mrs Kell and Mr Devlin, had the challenging task of evaluating the highly talented contestants. The worthy winner of the evening was Faith Williams in Year 10, who sang *Thank God It's Christmas* by Queen. Her effortless yet outstanding performance was later repeated at our termly Governors' Celebration event. The evening was hugely successful and provided students with an opportunity to showcase their skills that may not be obvious during their daily lessons in our Academy. The Music department is hoping to make this an annual event so watch this space! Faith was awarded with a day out at a local recording studio donated by a talented parent.

As part of Safer Internet Day, Mr Tovey gave an interesting assembly to all students to outline the ways in which the internet has changed in recent years. 

Our Design Technology department has been showcasing a 'Technology Wall' which is a real-life presentation of the timeline of technology over the years. It allows students to gain a visual understanding of how technology has advanced over time and continues to advance. Students are asked simple questions such as 'How do you listen to music?' and 'How do you take photographs?'. Students are then able to access, at any point, 'retro' and redundant devices by picking them up which links to the hands-on aspect of our subject, as it is through the kinaesthetic and visual aspect of our subject that allows students to understand the physical design of what they are handling.

After this process, students are then encouraged to about the creation and application of new or improved technologies, tools, systems, and processes that bring about significant advancements or breakthroughs in various fields.

Literary Lens

Our Key Stage 3 English students have participated in career themed lessons linked to topic areas they are studying. The lessons have provided students with the opportunity to connect the links between topics they study in their English lessons and real-life job roles in the working world. The English department believe that this is a great way to improve the intrinsic motivation to succeed in English as it will allow students to see how the skills they acquire in the classroom are utilised in different job roles.

Some of the lessons have included: looking at how graphic designers were used to create props that brought the Harry Potter novels to life; the use of poetry in the advertising campaigns of companies such as McDonalds and Coca-Cola; and the job role of costume design when studying the Shakespeare play *The Tempest*. Through the lessons, students have been introduced to individuals who have excelled in their creative fields in an aim to inspire them.
