Mrs Kell - Head of Nunthorpe Academy.





Sexual orientation is a protected characteristic and is therefore an area that Mrs Murray and the students who form Team Alliance try to educate our students about. They have established a strong connection with the local charity Hart Gables, which aims to spread awareness and give support to those within the LGBT+ community.

Mrs Murray said: "By doing the event, it supports those in the Academy who are a part of this community. This helps to create awareness amongst our students and it also helps to raise funds for Hart Gables so they can continue with their amazing work supporting those who are vulnerable."

A **space** for you!

Do you ever feel the need for some quiet time at school? If you do, you can go to our Safe Space. We know lots of students are curious to know more about this, so we spoke to Miss Dixon as she organises the Safe Space. Miss Dixon is a teacher, form tutor and Director of Student Leadership at Nunthorpe Academy.

"The 'Safe Space is a quiet and peaceful location for students to have a break and clear, their mind," Miss Dixon told us. She explained: "It is quieter than the dining room, which might suit students who don't like loud noises or large crowds". You can do lots of things at the Safe Space. They have board games that you can play, you can do a wordsearch or relax with colouring sheets. Sometimes you can do cool crafts as well.

Safe Space offers much more than this. Miss Dixon said: "It also helps if a student needs to chat to someone about any friendship or bullying issues, or if they just want to connect and make new friends." At Safe Space, there are Anti-Bullying Ambassadors present if anyone needs help or advice. At the moment, the Safe Space runs at lunchtime on days when Miss Dixon and her classroom (L2) are available. She is trying to find ways to make more space and time available.

Everybody is welcome to attend the Safe Space, but people with a sticker in their planner will be given priority. If you do not have a sticker, you may still be able to attend, depending if there is space. There are also expectations for behaviour to ensure that Safe Space stays a nice place. If you would like to try the Safe Space, ask your tutor about the days your year group can attend.
