### Words from the Headteacher

Welcome to our summer edition of our @Nunthorpe Magazine. We have said hello and welcome to **three new members of our senior team this term: Mrs Chapman-Jones, Deputy Headteacher Behaviour and Attitudes; Mrs Arnold, Assistant Headteacher Behaviour and Attitudes and Mrs Airstone, Assistant Headteacher, Teaching and Learning.** There has been a very deliberate and staggered review of all practices at Nunthorpe over the last term as a further response to our Ofsted in June 2024, new Areté Learning Trust Review in January 2025 and staff, student and parental voice which has been collected throughout the year.

The soft launch of our improved **Standards** agenda, supported by the **Standards Hub** and daily meet and greet have already impacted upon the presentation, attitudes for learning, focus and calmness of the academy day by removing any potential barriers and conflicts over standards and enabling students to focus on punctuality, attendance and the learning taking place. This will be enhanced in September through the improved and **simplified Behaviour Policy for September 2025** with the behaviour **principles of Ready, Respectful, Safe** and the **teaching principles of 'Five to Thrive'** expected within each lesson.

The **new and improved vision of Nunthorpe 'Thriving Together'** has been launched with all staff during briefings and training sessions; students through assemblies and parents and carers through year group presentation evenings. These have been well attended and supported demonstrating the ambition of all members of our community to 'Thrive Together'.

At Nunthorpe Academy we recognise the importance of and value involvement and engagement in the life and development of the Academy and the local community. We believe that education is a collaborative enterprise involving, amongst others, parents/carers, staff and children. As an Academy we are therefore committed to establishing and maintaining an effective and purposeful working relationship between the Academy, home and the local community which results in all partnerships 'Thriving Together' to allow each individual to be the 'best versions of themselves they can be'.

It is important to us that all of our students feel like they **belong** to and are **proud** of being a member of our academy and the local community. #### Mrs Chapman-Jones

#### Who are you and why did you want to come and work here?

I'm Mrs Chapman-Jones. I've been a teacher for 20 years. I started as a Teacher of English at King's Manor School in Middlesbrough. I worked there for 12 years, during which time the school amalgamated with Hallgarth School and became firstly, Oakfields Community College and then Outwood Academy Acklam. Behaviour and Attitudes is not just about managing conduct, but about actively promoting wellbeing, mutual respect, and collective progress.

Can you tell us three interesting facts about yourself?

I've written a book. My mum sadly passed away following a valiant battle with Acute Myeloid Leukaemia. While she was fighting, I wrote a blog to keep people updated; a few years ago, my dad persuaded me to publish the blog as a book. All the proceeds from sales are donated to Blood Cancer UK (formerly Leukaemia Research). The book is called 'I Stand Amazed'.

I am ¼ Italian. My Grandma (mum's mum) was born and raised in Trieste in Italy. She moved over here having married my Granda who she met after the war. Thanks to her I have dark hair, tan easily, and have a fiery temper! Italy will always be one of my favourite countries to visit.

I love reading! In fact, I love reading so much I even based my Masters thesis on it! (Maybe not interesting to many people, but definitely a passion of mine!)

#### Year 12 Wellbeing/Sports Day/Sport relief week

Year 12 have had a really busy few weeks of late, we have had the Year 12 Sports day week which included 'serious events' (Track and Field events), followed by the fun events the following day (egg and spoon, 3 legged race, wheelbarrow and tug of war). The key highlights over the 2 days had to be the tutor relay race on day one, this saw all 4 tutor groups cross the line at virtually the same time. They experienced a practical lesson in Science whereby students dissected a kidney, discussed a real trial situation in Law and used Lego in Business to have a realistic understanding of production methods.



Year 12 UCAS event saw 54 parents and students attend an information evening hosted by Sixth form leadership and Teesside University. Guidance was delivered on the UCAS process and apprenticeships. Teesside University provided up to date information on the new Personal statement that students must now produce and send off as part of their UCAS applications. They also delivered guidance on student finance to support parents during their son/daughters' transition and journey through university. All the information delivered was shared with Year 12 parents.

### <u>Art</u>

Year 7 have been taking inspiration from British artist Jon Burgerman. He creates playful and humorous paintings and objects that cloak a collective anxiety about the turbulent world we live in.

Students have created imagery using soft friendly shapes and bold colours interplayed to create compositions that display an aesthetic joy but belie conflicting emotions beneath the surface. These relate to a generational mental health crisis, exasperated by climate anxiety, the narrowing of political choice and financial insecurity. Despite the fraught intentions, the light and colourful nature of the works offer a positive wider outlook and that there is always the chance for hope and joy!

We have selected a winner from each class who have been awarded an art journal donated by the artist after being impressed by students' work he saw on our socials.

Our school's recent GCSE Art Exhibition was a resounding success, showcasing the exceptional creativity, skill, and dedication of our Year 11 students. The event featured a diverse range of work—from intricate drawings and paintings to innovative mixed media —demonstrating both technical excellence and thoughtful exploration of personal themes. Parents, staff, and peers were deeply impressed by the maturity and originality on display, with many visitors praising the high standard of the artwork. The exhibition not only celebrated the students' hard work but also *E* highlighted the vibrant role of the arts in our school community.







### **Business Studies**

On Thursday 12 June our Year 10 Business students completed a Young Enterprise day with Sofia Windfarms. They worked in teams and had a fantastic day completing various tasks and activities. Students had the chance to develop their communication, leadership and teamwork skills whilst doing tasks on budgeting and marketing. Students then competed against each other and presented their ideas to the rest of the groups. Then the winning teams were selected for different categories.



### <u>Computing</u>

We have recently successfully applied to be a Cyber First School and have been granted a Bronze award. This partnership will allow us to get Ambassadors from the Cyber Security world to come into school and is a really exciting opportunity for our students.

Over the next couple of weeks we will be getting our Lego Robotics club up and running. Details will follow.

### <u>Drama</u>

The Drama Department has been a hive of excitement and activities across this academic year. Beginning in February, students were lucky

enough to experience the sights and sounds of London as they attended a four day residential, as part of their GCSE course. Taking

in both 'The Play That Goes Wrong' as well as the musical, 'Wicked' students were also able to experience a backstage tour of London's

largest theatre, The National Theatre, looking at what goes on behind the scenes to create magic on stage. They also took the load off in

Madame Tussauds, rubbing shoulders with some of the best (and worst) people of modern and ancient times, across the museum. The highlight, or nightmare, of the trip for most was however a trip around the London Dungeons. Journeying through

Component Two in GCSE Drama, with our Year 13 doing the same but at A Level for a visiting examiner. This year also saw our academy production of Matilda. Featuring a cast of well over 50 students across years eight to thirteen, audiences were blown away with the talent on offer from some of our students. A special shout out to Marshall, one of our Y13 drama students, who took

part in his last academy production this year; playing the infamous Agatha Trunchball. His performance was stand-out and will certainly

be missed as he moves into a degree in drama, at Arden in September.

It's always a pleasure to talk about one of the most exciting and overlooked places in our community—Nunthorpe Academy Library. ### Geography

#### Year 10 GCSE Geography Fieldwork

This year GCSE Geography students spent the day in Redcar to carry out two different enquiries in the morning and afternoon. Due to the tides we spent the morning in the town investigating the different stages of regeneration that have been going on and getting public opinion on whether it has been successful. In the afternoon we spent time on the beach investigating whether the groynes were effective and attempted to work out the direction of longshore drift – unfortunately for us the wind had different ideas and did not give us the answers we wanted! But the good weather and a refreshing lemon top made up for it...

wonderful partner school, Stokesley. The day was bright and sunny and allowed for great exploration of the Holderness coast with students visiting well known case study sites such as Mappleton, Hornsea, Flamborough, Easington and Spurn head. At each site students conducted a number of different fieldwork methods including sand dune biodiversity, beach profiles and environmental impact assessments, to help them answer the question 'How and why do coastal landscapes along the Holderness coast change?' In the evening students ventured into Hull to the hotel followed by bowling and Nandos.

Friday saw an early start for breakfast then into Hull City centre for some human fieldwork. After a detailed walking tour of the main regeneration sites students worked in small groups to conduct interviews, litter surveys, graffiti assessments and pedestrian count to help them answer the question of ' How successful are the Government intervention strategies used at Hull?' Students got stuck into each activity and worked well with the Stokesley teams throughout the residential. A big

thank you to Stokesley for inviting us to join this amazing trip. Students will use their experiences to help them in conducting their own research enquiry questions for their NEA which is worth 30% of their final grade.





Thursday 10 July saw 27 of our students from across Years 7, 8 and 9 set off to Darlington to participate in a Net Zero Workshop morning. Upon arriving at Teesside University's Atom centre we went straight to the first session on the role of carbon and where carbon is emitted from. Students then undertook 2 small activities - the first working out how much carbon was produced in everyday items such as a Big Mac and then a team tower building contest.

Following on from this we went to our second workshop where students learnt about the current carbon capture and storage project that is being undertaken in our local area. Students were able to participate in a small scientific experiment showing how the carbon could be collected and then had a go at project managing; looking at the actual construction element of the project. Students showed a great attitude towards their learning, with many volunteering answers and several standing up to share their understanding with their peers and other schools. A big thank you to Mrs Blacklock for organising this trip and a huge thank you to the students for their exemplary behaviour and attitude towards learning.





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### **Government & Politics**

#### Sixth Form Students Debate Democracy and Populism in Engaging Politics Lesson

Sixth form students took centre stage in a lively A-Level Politics debate this week, tackling major political themes including the state of democracy, the rise of new political parties, and the growing influence of populism in both the UK and the USA.

As part of their curriculum, students were given the opportunity to research and present arguments on how democratic systems are evolving, what challenges they face, and how political movements on both sides of the Atlantic are reshaping traditional party politics. From the emergence of outsider parties to the appeal of populist leaders, the debate reflected the complexity and urgency of current political discourse.

The classroom was transformed into a debating chamber, with students working in teams to develop and defend their viewpoints. Topics included whether populism strengthens or undermines democracy, and how effectively established political institutions respond to public dissatisfaction.

"Our aim was to encourage critical thinking, respectful disagreement, and a deeper understanding of contemporary politics," said Mr Devlin who led the session. "The students really rose to the occasion—they were articulate, passionate, and demonstrated real insight."

The debate also gave students the chance to hone valuable skills such as public speaking, evaluation, and teamwork. "It was great to be able to voice our opinions and engage in proper political discussion," said one Year 12 student. "It definitely made me think more deeply about how politics works in real life."

With students expressing enthusiasm for future debates, the session highlighted how active learning can bring politics to life—and prepare young people to become informed and engaged citizens.

Luke Myers MP also visited Year 12 and Year 13 students and talked all things Politics. He introduced them to his pathway into Politics as well as taking questions on concerns students had in relation to their local community, funding, potholes and many other issues that they raised.

Here at sixth form, we provide students with guidance from professionals in differing industries and we very much appreciate Luke's time with us.



### <u>History</u>

It's been a busy term for the History Department. Year 7s have been investigating the Gunpowder Plot (1605), whilst Year 8s have been analysing the long and short term causes of World War I. Year 9 have started their GCSE studies by examining the early days of the American "Wild West" and Year 10s are coming to the end of their Medicine Through Time studies by investigating medical developments in the modern era. Meanwhile Year 12 are drawing their studies of the USSR (1917-1991) to a close, whilst starting a new topic if The British Experience of Warfare (c1790-1918).

Of course, Year 11 and Year 13 both sat their exams, and we wish all of our students well.

### <u>Law</u>

### A-Level Students Take the Stand in Mock Murder Trial

Sixth form students stepped into the shoes of barristers, judges, and witnesses as they took part in a gripping mock murder trial, bringing the courtroom to life as part of their A-Level studies. The trial, adapted from the University of Southern California's renowned Moot Court program to suit the English legal system, offered students the chance to explore real-world legal principles through an engaging, hands-on experience. This is the second time the school has hosted a mock trial, and it proved just as popular and impactful as the first.

The case centred around a fictional murder scenario, with students taking on the roles of prosecution, defence, witnesses, and members of the jury. They prepared arguments, examined evidence, and underwent cross-examinations—all while adhering to courtroom procedures used in the UK legal system.





"It's one thing to study the law in a classroom, but it's another to actually apply it in a courtroom setting," said Mr Devlin, who coordinated the activity. "The students showed incredible dedication, critical thinking, and teamwork." Students described the experience as both challenging and enjoyable. "It gave me a real insight into how complex and fascinating legal work can be," said one Year 12 participant. "I never thought I'd enjoy standing up and arguing a case, but it was amazing."

The mock trial is part of a broader effort to make legal education more accessible and dynamic, and it has already inspired several students to consider careers in law. With growing interest and positive feedback, the school hopes to continue offering this opportunity in future years.

#### Year 13 Law Students Boost Confidence with Intensive Contract Law Programme

Year 13 Law students have successfully completed a seven-week intensive intervention programme focused on contract law, one of the most challenging areas of the A-Level curriculum.

The programme, designed to consolidate previous learning and support revision, provided students with a structured and focused opportunity to revisit key concepts, test their understanding, and clarify any misconceptions. Covering topics such as offer and acceptance, consideration, and breach of contract, the sessions aimed to strengthen both subject knowledge and exam technique.

Led by Mr Devlin, the intervention sessions combined interactive teaching, group discussion, and case study analysis to deepen students' understanding of complex legal principles. The targeted support was especially welcomed by students preparing for their final exams.

"Contract law can be difficult to master, so this programme was really helpful," said one student. "It gave us the chance to go back over tricky areas and make sure we truly understood them."

Teachers reported a noticeable boost in student confidence by the end of the programme. "The aim was to give students the time and space to address gaps in understanding," said Mr Devlin. "We saw real progress—not just in their knowledge, but in their ability to apply legal reasoning with confidence."

The success of the intervention has encouraged plans to extend similar support to other areas of the course in future. With exams approaching, students are feeling more prepared and better equipped to tackle one of the most rigorous elements of A-Level Law.

## Philosophy & Ethics (R.E.)

#### Students Bring Hinduism to Life in A-Level Philosophy and Ethics Class

A-Level Philosophy and Ethics students at Nunthorpe Sixth Form had a unique and immersive experience last month as they constructed a Hindu shrine as part of their religious studies curriculum.

The activity was designed to deepen students' understanding of Hindu worship and the role of faith in everyday life. Working together, they recreated a traditional shrine using authentic artifacts such as murtis (images of deities), incense, a bell, and offerings of fruit and flowers. The students also participated in a simplified version of a Hindu puja ceremony, taking time to reflect on its spiritual meaning.

As part of the lesson, students presented on the significance of each item used in worship and discussed how faith plays a central role in Hindu practice. "It was a really hands-on way to learn about a religion that many of us weren't very familiar with," said one Year 12 student. "It helped us see beyond textbook learning and understand the deeper meaning behind the rituals."

Their teacher, Mr Devlin, praised the students for their enthusiasm and thoughtful engagement. "It was wonderful to see the students take ownership of their learning. This kind of experiential lesson allows them to connect with religious traditions in a respectful and meaningful way."

The session was described as both enjoyable and eye-opening by many of the students, sparking lively discussions about the importance of religious literacy and cultural understanding.



## <u>Psychology</u>

In Psychology we have been demonstrating our biopsychology knowledge in practice. Students have been making neurons from Play-Doh and adding labels. Student's then demonstrated the process of synaptic transmission, using Play-Doh.
